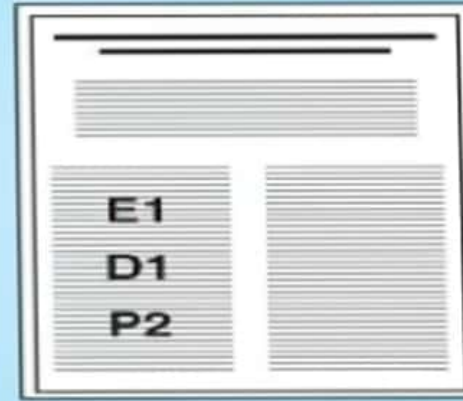
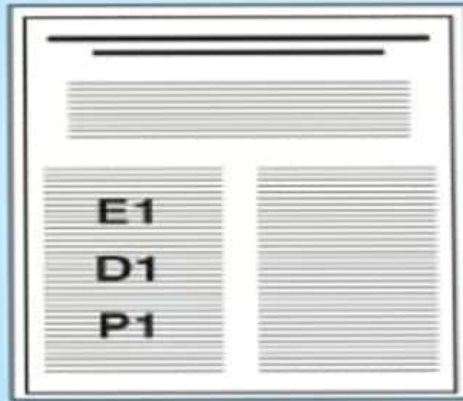
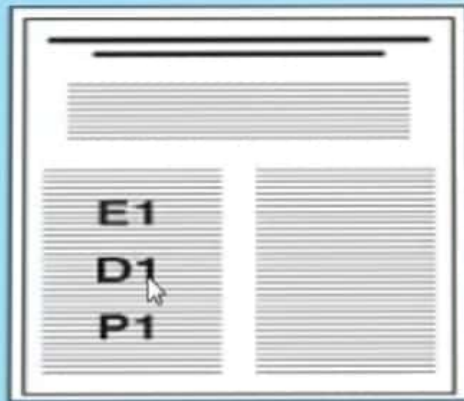
Schaller, George B. *The Mountain Gorilla: Ecology and Behavior*. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1963. Print. One of the earliest comprehensive studies on the mountain gorilla; this book provided a foundation for later studies. Author George Schaller is acknowledged as a pioneer in the field, having traveled to study gorillas in 1959 at the age of 26.

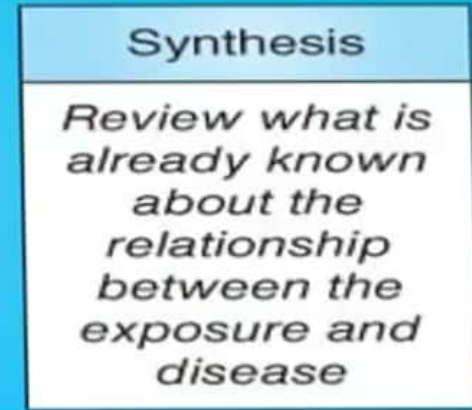
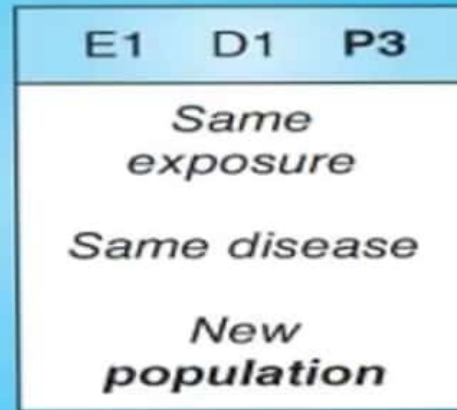
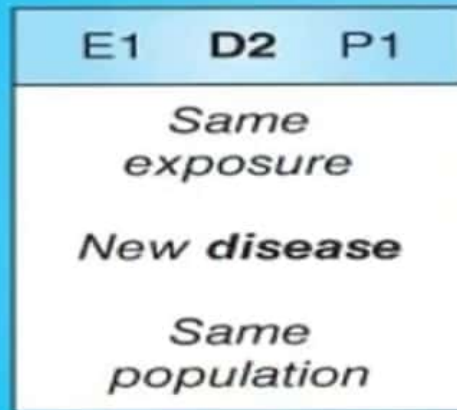
3.7 What Makes Research Original?
